Draw an animal that could use some adaptations to help it to be more suited to the environment.

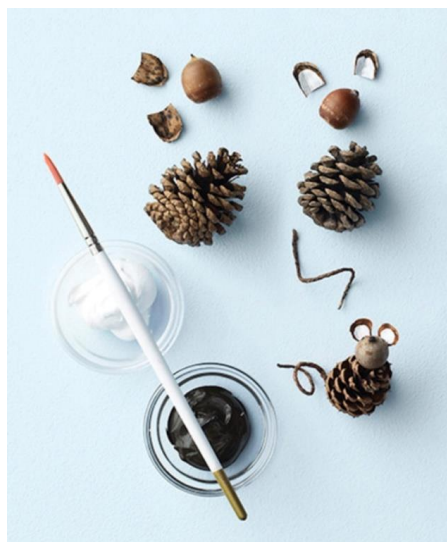
A frog with fur could be outside during the winter!

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Step 3: Rainy day music activity

Supplies:

- Paper towel or toilet paper empty roll
- Aluminum foil
- Tape
- Different things to put inside like a hand full of M&M's, uncooked rice, dry cereal or dried beans.

Tape the aluminum foil to one end, choose which item you want to try first, then tape another piece of aluminum foil to close the tube and shake. Which one sounds most like rain?

Step 4: Take pictures of an outdoor space you love at three different times of day.

What happens to the light? Did the sun cast different shadows? Write down what time of day is your favorite and why.

Step 5: Design a terrarium using a recycled glass jar
